

NATIVES IN THE YARD

There was no question which animal I was going to write about for this newsletter. It popped right out at me. As I was driving down Eldorado Way last week, an otter hopped across the road right in front of my car. Since I have seen them many times in our yard, it's a perfect choice for Natives in the Yard.

River otters are common in all Florida waters except for the true saltwater habitats. They can be found in brackish river waters, fresh water ponds and salt-water marshes. In our community, you might see them playing in the lakes, running on the grass or crossing the road.

These animals are aquatic carnivores with long streamlined bodies, thick muscular tails and short legs with clawed and webbed feet. They are dark brown to black in color with lighter shades of brown around their face. Their fur is dense and soft and the under fur is oiled to keep their bodies dry and insulated while in the water. Adults are from 3 to 4 feet long and weigh from 12 to 30 pounds. The males are larger than females.

Most active in the daytime, especially from dawn to midmorning and at sunset, otters use their sensitive long whiskers to hunt for their food in murky waters. Their diet consists mostly of aquatic animals such as frogs, fish, turtles, crayfish and crabs, but they are also known to eat small birds, bird eggs, and small land animals. They are excellent swimmers and have the ability to stay under water for three to four minutes on one breath. During that time, they can swim a quarter of a mile at speeds up to six miles per hour or can dive to sixty feet.

Otters are mostly solitary animals. Males and females are only together during mating season. If you see a group of otters, it's most likely a mother with her young from the previous breeding season. Otters do not build their own den but instead, use burrows of other animals or natural hollows. An average of two to three pups are in a litter and March and April are the peak months for their birth. The young pups are helpless at birth. They are even unable to swim. The female tends to them for the first eight weeks of their life.

These extremely intelligent animals communicate with one another through whistles, growls, chuckles and screams. In captivity, they have been taught to capture and release fish and to retrieve waterfowl. Playful in nature, they have been observed sliding down mud banks and playing games with one another in the water. Keep your eyes peeled on our lakes and the lakes at Lost Lake along Seabranch Boulevard. You might be treated to a show presented by some river otters.




The Bev Gregory Library By Andres Sugrue

HANDBAGS

ave you ever noticed gals who sit their handbags on public toilet floors, then go directly to their dining tables and set it on the table? Happens a lot! It's not always the

Sometimes "what you don't know will hurt you!" We decided to find out if handbags harbor a lot of bacteria. We learned how to test them at Nelson Laboratories in Salt Lake and then we set out to test the average woman's handbag. Most women told us they didn't stop to think about what was on the bottom of their handbag. Most said at home they usually set their handbags on top of kitchen tables and counters where food is prepared. Most of the ladies we talked to told us they wouldn't be surprised if their handbags were at least a little bit dirty. It turns out handbags are so surprisingly dirty, even the microbiologist who tested them was shocked.

'restaurant food' that causes stomach distress.

Microbiologist Amy Karen of Nelson Labs says nearly all of the handbags tested were not only high in bacteria, but high in harmful kinds of bacteria. Pseudomonas can cause eye infections, staphylococcus aurous can cause serious skin infections, and salmonella and e-coli found on the handbags could make people very sick. In one sampling, four of five handbags tested positive for salmonella, and that's not the worst of it. "There is fecal contamination on the handbags" says Amy. Leather or vinyl handbags tended to be cleaner than cloth handbags, and lifestyle seemed to play a role. People with kids tended to have dirtier handbags than those without, with one exception. The handbag of one single woman who frequented nightclubs had one of the worst contaminations of all. "Some type of feces, or possibly vomit," says Amy.

So the moral of this story is that your handbag won't kill you, but it does have the potential to make you very sick if you keep it on places where you eat. Use hooks to hang your handbag at home and in toilets, and don't put it on your desk, a restaurant table, or on your kitchen counter top. Your handbag has gone where individuals before you have sneezed, coughed, spat, urinated, emptied bowels, etc! Do you really want to bring that home with you? The microbiologists at Nelson also said cleaning a handbag will help. Wash cloth handbags and use leather cleaner to clean the bottom of leather handbags.

<u>Grass Cutting</u> – Due to imposed water restrictions, our landscapers are cutting the grass a bit higher than normal to help retain soil moisture. All watering in The Retreat is limited to Thursday for about 16 hours at approximately 15 minutes per zone.

<u>Grass Chemical Treatment</u> – Residents should be aware that Concepts in Greenery, from time to time, needs to spray chemicals on the grass. The spraying can be for unwanted invasive grasses, treatments for fungus or ants and other bugs. The chemicals used are environmentally friendly but when they are first applied and at their strongest concentration, residents should be watchful with small children and pets.

Run dishwasher when fully loaded




