NEWS FROM OUR BOARD OF DIRECTORS By Coni Mc Guinn

Since the last newsletter, the Board of Directors held two meetings and hosted the first meeting of the Homeowners Association on March 8th. Highlights of those meetings included a motion to **not** renew the Bristol Management contract and to hire **Capital Realty Company** effective May 1st. The new on-site manager is **Gina Cotto**. Hours, phone, and e-mail information will be the same as before. It was also voted **not** to renew the contract for Saunders and the new landscaping company is **Concepts in Greenery** located in Palm City.

A letter was received from the Martin County Safety Officer regarding SeaWind School. **There will be a crack down on speeders in the area.** Anyone wishing to visit the school must register at the office. Another safety issue is that children living in the *Retreat* and attending SeaWind should **not** use the East gate but go the long way through the development to get to school.

The lakes in the community will be stocked by Superior Waterways sometime in mid April with largemouth bass, bluegill, minnows/golden shiners, and channel catfish. Stocking the lakes keeps them clean, helps the overall ecology, and supports wildlife. Residents are allowed to catch and release in the lakes. Also living in the lakes along with the fish are snakes and ALLIGATORS. Use caution when walking in the lake areas!

New committees being formed are:

- (1) Benches Bench memorials will be placed in strategic areas of the community.
- (2) Garden Club To do fall plantings in the roadway circle, clubhouse and East gate entrance.
- (3) Recreation Care of the community center and pool.
- (4) Utilities Review utility contracts and recommend changes.

VISIT TO HOPE RURAL SCHOOL By Sandy Goldfarb



On February 15th members of the Outreach Committee of The Women's Club visited the **Hope Rural School.** Sister Mary Dooley and Sister Marion Hangsterfer discussed the school's philosophy and funding.

This includes total English immersion as well as parental involvement. School financing depends on donations made through fund raising and grants from various sources. Although parents are charged \$100 per year, the actual cost of educating a child is close to \$7,000 per year. The school is fully accredited by the state.

The school serves approximately 100 students in grades K-5. They plan on adding a full day pre-school program next year. Many of the teachers wear several hats at the school. We met "Coach" who drives their school bus, teaches physical education, and also does counseling with the children.



Our group was divided into two, and we each had an opportunity to tour several classrooms as well as their garden. One project instituted at the school involves garden plots. Families can maintain their own garden plot to grow vegetables and flowers.



Helping to beautify their campus are wonderful murals on the outside of the buildings and on the garden fence created by the children. These murals depict scenes from their native countries. Most of the children come from Guatemala.

The Outreach Committee will be helping the school move their library and set up a new computer lab. Individuals may volunteer to act as a tutor, mentor, or help with the after school program.

Mini-grant forms were left at the school for the teachers. These forms will be submitted to the Outreach Committee for consideration. After reviewing their needs, the committee will present recommendations to The Women's Club as to which project



we hope to raise money for and support during this year. If you are interested in volunteering at the school, contact **Sister Marion at 772.597.2203**.

MORE THAN JUST A STORM WATER RETENTION POND...

It starts with a surface water engineering plan that meets water management districts' requirement for a retention pond. Add a lake design that includes a shallow shoreline Plant an assortment of aquatic vegetation to area. provide oxygen, absorb excess nutrients and provide cover for fish. Stock with a balanced population of native fish such as largemouth bass that feed on the insecteating fishes (bream and shiners) and catfish that vacuum the depths of the water. Turtles set up housekeeping. Herons, egrets, ibis, wood storks and other wading birds visit the pond. Cormorants and anhinga swim underwater in pursuit of small fish. An osprey or eagle may grab a large game fish. A playful river otter captures a frog. An occasional migratory alligator adds to local conversation. Life continues in the Retreat ponds.

The Retreat Board of Directors recently approved the fish stocking of the ten bodies of water within our development. The stocking, considered an important link in the ecology of the ponds was the recommendation of the contractor that is presently responsible for the maintenance of our lakes.

Hurricane Shutter Reminder

This is just a reminder to all of our residents who travel North for the summer months. Hurricane shutters are to be installed at the time of an impending storm and not prior to your departure. Last year's two storms have many concerned about the safety of their home but it is important to point out that our Community's Covenants state that in your absence, you are responsible to designate a person or firm that will install and remove the shutters when needed for storm protection. In addition, it is not a good practice to have shutters on your home for any length of time. Proper ventilation, fire safety and a "flag" your home is vacant are a few reasons why hurricane shutters should not be left on a home longer than necessary.

Realizing that many homeowners are looking for a reliable person to put up hurricane shutters, our Property Manager is taking the names of residents who are looking for someone to do the installation and also, residents who would be willing to install the shutters either for a fee or as a volunteer. If you are interested in having your name put on either of these lists, just call the Property Manager's office at 546.6112. Our Property Manager will then share the information she has gathered to help you in your search for a person to install your shutters.

Helping Our Community Maintain the Irrigation System

In the past we have asked community members to tap down sprinkler heads that may get stuck in the up position. Many residents who walk the community have done this, and we thank you for your help.

Now there is another way you can help. At the Community meeting at SeaWind Elementary School, I advised those in attendance that we had ordered flags to use for marking faulty sprinkler heads and other irrigation The ordered flags have arrived and are problems. available for pickup at the Retreat office during manned hours by any interested resident. These flags may be used to mark problem spots on your property, along our roads and sidewalks, or on common property. When you mark an area with a flag, please call the Retreat office at 546.6112. A work order will then be completed and the irrigation technician will come out to fix the problem. It might be a good idea to keep 2 to 3 flags in your garage. We will also make flags available to you at Board Meetings.

A Reminder to All Retreat Residents

When you purchased your home in the Retreat, you signed a document that stated that you read, understood and agreed to abide by all rules and regulations in the Homeowner Documents Book. The Board of Directors (BOD) is charged with enforcing the regulations in this document for the benefit of the community as a whole. Several articles in these documents that your BOD and its sub-committees have to deal with are as follows:

1. According to these documents, the only item that is allowed to be placed in the front of our homes is one regulation American Flag that must be attached adjacent to the garage door of a unit. **ALL** other items, unless permitted by Florida law, require written approval of the Architectural Control Committee (ACC) or your BOD. Please read and familiarize yourself with Article XI – Architectural Control, pages 31-33 and Article XII – Use Restrictions, Pages 33-38 of the Covenants.

2. Know where your property line is so the HOA does not have to ask you to remove plantings or other items from Association Common Property. When you went to closing on your home, a copy of your property survey should have been included with the closing documents. This survey shows the measurements as to where your property ends and Common Property begins.

3. ACC approval is also required if you add to your home, change or expand garden locations from the Developers plan, add trees or shrubs to your property, add a pool or fence etc.

If we all comply with the articles in the Homeowner Documents Book, our community will look better than it already does and all of our property values will be enhanced.

Neighborhood Watch

Going Away?

Very soon many in our community will return to their Northern homes or enjoy a summer vacation. The Neighborhood Watch Group suggests you follow these simple steps to help protect your property while you are away:

- 1. Stop newspapers and other deliveries.
- 2. Transfer valuables and cash to a safe deposit box.
- 3. Place radios and lights on timers.
- 4. Turn down volume on your telephone and answering machine so they cannot be heard outside.
- 5. Close blinds or curtains.
- 6. Arrange to have hurricane panels installed and removed. There are companies that provide these services.
- 7. Notify neighbors and provide an emergency phone contact.

When away from home at any time, we strongly advise you take advantage of your home security system. Activate the system.

Solicitors?

Some complain about solicitors. We understand the concept of free enterprise; notwithstanding, the Neighborhood Watch Program has posted signs and does <u>not</u> condone solicitors in our community. If you are approached by unwanted sales people and are fearful, we suggest you call 911 immediately. The deputy will resolve the problem.

What Hurricane WATCH and WARNING Mean

• WATCH: Hurricane conditions are *possible* in the specified area of the WATCH, usually within 36 hours.

• WARNING: Hurricane conditions are *expected* in the specified area of the WARNING, usually within 24 hours.

When a Hurricane WATCH Is Issued

• Listen to <u>NOAA</u> Weather Radio or local radio or TV stations for up-to-date storm information.

• Prepare to bring inside any lawn furniture, outdoor decorations or ornaments, trash cans, hanging plants, and anything else that can be picked up by the wind.

• Prepare to cover all windows of your home. If shutters have not been installed, use precut plywood. *Note:* Tape does not prevent windows from breaking, so taping windows is not recommended.

• Fill your car's gas tank.

• Check batteries and stock up on canned food, first aid supplies, drinking water, and medications.

What to Do When a Hurricane WARNING Is Issued

• Listen to the advice of local officials, and leave if they tell you to do so.

• Complete preparation activities.

• If you are not advised to evacuate, stay indoors, away from windows.

• Be aware that the calm "eye" is deceptive; the storm is not over. The worst part of the storm will happen once the eye passes over and the winds blow from the opposite direction. Trees, shrubs, buildings, and other objects damaged by the first winds can be broken or destroyed by the second winds.

• Be alert for tornadoes. Tornadoes can happen during a hurricane and after it passes over. Remain indoors, in the center of your home, in a closet or bathroom without windows.

Stay away from flood waters. If you come upon a flooded road, turn around and go another way. If you are caught on a flooded road and waters are rising rapidly around you, get out of the car and climb to higher ground.

Leaving Your Retreat Home ...

If you will be leaving your Retreat home for an extended period of time, Retreat resident *Marlene Boobar* suggests creating a "Close Up" Check List. Check off each item as it is completed. Here is a sample list which you can fine-tune to meet your needs:

HURRICANE TIPS FROM RETREAT RESIDENTS

- ✓ Dottie Sacco: Fill plastic bags with water and freeze. If power fails, water will keep freezer or refrigerator cold. When it melts, you have drinking water.
- ✓ Bonnie Becker: One of the most helpful hints I had was to purchase gallons of water and freeze it. Then place the frozen gallons in the refrigerator to keep temperatures cool until power went on.
- ✓ Gene Gillis: Before the storm, I sent an e-mail to a large number of people that I thought would be interested in the status after the hurricane. In the e-mail, I also asked a relative in Massachusetts to save the e-mail and then do a "reply all" to the e-mail when I called her with the status. The phones were out and the cell phones were overwhelmed with calls. This proved to be a very effective way to keep everyone informed.
- ✓ Jan Kasuboske: When hurricane Charlie hit the Gulf, I offered our house to some of our friends that are permanent residents at Punta Gorda. I told them the necessary things to do to our house to make it temporarily livable. That included opening the main water valve. What I did not realize was that sometime during the summer, someone had opened the water valve in the back. They obviously got no water, and walked away leaving it "open." Consequently, when the people from Punta Gorda turned on the main water valve in front of the house, the valve in the back was still open. It ran for about 24 hours before it was discovered. We pay close to 1 cent a gallon for water and sewer. My water bill was over \$80. This year, I am going to remove the knobs or handles from each spigot before I leave to remedy the problem.
- \checkmark Becky Freedman: (1) Two things I did learn from last season: Have at least two fine quality coolers from which to eat for the first two days of power loss. Do not open refrigerator and freezer, (that we kept blanketed, after turning the temperatures down to the coldest setting 24 hours before the hurricane was forecast to hit), until absolutely necessary. I also turned our air conditioning to the coldest setting 24 hours ahead of the storm, and we did very well through the first three days of the power loss....after that, we were resigned to waiting out the loss of power. (2) This is a community that loves to help our neighbors, but each homeowner must take responsibility for education and preparedness. Remaining calm and positive, having a sense of humor...these are qualities as important as any other type of emergency assistance. (3) I am putting together a kit full of games and prizes...to pass the hours in as lighthearted a manner as possible.

RECIPE CORNER

NEIMAN-MARCUS COOKIES

(Recipe may be halved)

A lady with her daughter finished lunch at a Neiman-Marcus Café and decided to have a small dessert. Because both were cookie lovers, they decided to try the Neiman-Marcus cookie. It was so excellent that they asked her for the recipe. The waitress said with a small frown, "I'm afraid not, but you can buy the recipe." They asked how much, and she responded, "Only two fifty-it's a great deal!" The ladies agreed to buy it and told her to just add it to the tab. Thirty days the lady received her credit statement, and she then realized the recipe cost her two-hundred and fifty dollars! So, enjoy this recipe for all it is worth.

2 cups butter 24 oz. chocolate chips 4 cups flour 2 cups brown sugar 2 tsp. soda 1 tsp. salt 2 cups sugar 1 8 oz. Hershey Bar (grated) 5 cups blended oatmeal 4 eggs 2 tsp. baking powder 2 tsp. vanilla 3 cups chopped nuts (your choice)

Measure oatmeal, and blend in a blender to a fine powder. Cream the butter and both sugars. Add eggs and vanilla, mix together with flour, oatmeal, salt, baking powder, and soda. Add chocolate chips, Hershey Bar, and nuts. Roll into balls, and place two inches apart on a cookie sheet.

Bake for 10 minutes at 375 degrees. Makes 112 cookies.

Chocolate Dessert

6 oz. bittersweet chocolate

4 oz. semi-sweet chocolate

10 tbsp. Butter

1 1/2 cups powdered sugar

1/2 cup all purpose flour

3 eggs

1 tsp. vanilla extract

2 tbsp. orange liquor, optional

Vanilla ice cream or whip cream

Preheat over to 425 degrees. In double boiler, melt chocolate and butter. Gradually add powdered sugar and flour. Add eggs, one at a time. Stir until smooth. Add vanilla extract and liquor. Divide into 6 custard cups. Bake 14 minutes. Run knife around cup and invert on plate. Center should be gooey. Garnish with ice cream or whip cream.

Note that cakes can be made 2-3 days in advance. Refrigerate. Let stand at room temperature for 30 minutes before baking.
